

WHO OWNS IT?

The water park is a vast area owned by many different land owners and businesses.

WHO CREATED IT?

The Cotswold Water Park Joint Committee formed in 1967 was created to control the development of the area.

The committee included representation from:

- Gloucestershire County Council
- Wiltshire Council Council
- Cirencester Rural District Council
- Cricklade & Wootton Bassett Rural District Council

WHO RUNS IT?

It is down to the specific land owners to manage and maintain but a huge part of the successful growth of the Cotswold Water Park is credited to The Cotswold Lakes Trust.

The charity was initially set up by the four local authorities and they carry the ethos of the orginal committee to deliver four main aims:



Access, Conservation, Leisure and Education.

The trust owns and manages two country parks, five car parks and five nature reserves within the Cotswold Water Park.

They also provide a focal point for visitors through both the visitor centre and waterpark.org which advertises and promotes the local businesses that operate within.



WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

Quite simply the Cotswolds has never been more popular as a tourist destination as it is now.

For visitors looking for somewhere to stay, the Cotswold Water Park meets all the requirements with a huge variation of accommodations.

Whilst a lot of the Cotswolds gives you endless opportunity to look and explore, the Water Park gives visitors something to do, and aside from the huge natural benefits, it's now a thriving activity hub.

A water park is an amusement park that features water play areas such as swimming pools, water slides, splash pads, water playgrounds, and lazy rivers, as well as areas for floating, bathing, swimming, and other barefoot environments.

A name is crucial, and in marketing terms is a potential customer's first impression of a brand.

It would be hard to put a number on how many people miss out or avoid visiting the area because of the name.

From the local business owners, to the tourist information centres, there is a familiar story of confusion when it comes to explaining to people what it is, where it is and what is available.


